

## SUPER LEARNING WEEK: MATHS MISSION IMPOSSIBLE!

















### **SHOUT OUT TO OUR BUDDIES!**

Here at Oswald Road we really appreciate all the hard work done by our fantastic Lunchtime Buddies, so we thought it only right to give them a special shout out so that everyone knows the good that they do!

The Buddies system comprises of Year 5 and Year 6 pupils. To be appointed as a Buddy the pupils must complete an application, which is then assessed by the Pastoral Team and daily duties are then formulated. The Buddies are on duty every lunchtime in the playground, and they are identifiable by wearing a yellow baseball cap.

The buddies are available to support the younger children in the playground. They use their personal skills to advise, develop, boost confidence and generally guide the children in the right direction.

















### **CLOWNING AROUND AT THE CIRCUS!**

This term Reception went to the Magical Circus in Birkenhead as part of their exciting topic for this half term, 'Clowning Around'. The action-packed day began with a circus show in the main hall, which included juggling, tight-wire walking, plate spinning and stilt walking.

The children then moved into the circus room where they learnt about the history of the circus, and some of the children were selected to dress up as Indians and clowns. This was a great opportunity to look at different circus props including clown shoes and the ringmaster costume.

The children were then given some time to play in the playroom which included rocking horses, a helter-skelter, circus dress up area and a children's cinema. The last part of the day involved the children practicing some circus tricks on their own, and having a go at doing their own plate spinning, juggling and even stilt walking!







Year 1 took part in an exciting Lego Workshop earlier this week, which links to their Geography topic for this half term- 'Towns and Cities'. Each child built their own small part of a city out of Lego, and they then worked collaboratively as a whole year group to put their pieces together to create a complete city with lots of different buildings. Their city nearly took up the length of the school hall!!













### TRADITIONAL TALES

This half term Nursery's topic was 'Traditional Tales', and the children have been taking inspiration from some of their favourite books to make their own delicious treats! First of all they made porridge, just like Goldilocks steals from the three bears (and yes, it was just right!) This was also a great opportunity for the children to learn about healthy eating. The children also baked their own gingerbread biscuits after reading The Gingerbread Man, which required them to test their maths in real life skills when measuring out their ingredients!

### YEAR 3 GO BACK TO THE STONE AGE!










### A DAY IN THE LIFE OF....

#### Mr Keeley- Year 6 Teacher and Year 5/6 Phase Leader

I have an extremely varied, enjoyable and rewarding job. First and foremost I am a Year 6 teacher but I am also the Phase Leader for Upper Key Stage 2. Some of my duties involve supporting teachers, monitoring children's books, and tracking the progress of catch-up interventions.

### Tuesday 7th February-



- 7.00am- I like to arrive at school nice and early. At this time school is really calm and quiet (with no children around I get lots done!) I start by doing any printing needed for the day's lessons. When Mrs Gandhi gets in at 8.00am she very kindly trims all the resources so that they fit into the children's books. I like to ensure that all books and resources are out on tables so that lessons can start immediately when then the children arrive.
- **8.45am-** I go out onto the playground and perform my very important job of ringing the school bell to signal to the children that it is time for school to start.
- **8.50am-** At this time the children come into school and start their SODA (Start of Day Activity). This morning the children are doing a mixture of

arithmetic questions. At 9.00am I take the register and spend time supporting the children with their arithmetic.

**9.10am-** We start the maths lesson. We are looking at finding missing angles in different shapes. The problems we are doing today are linked with our previous topic of ratio and proportion.

### A DAY IN THE LIFE OF....

#### Mr Keeley- Year 6 Teacher and Year 5/6 Phase Leader

- **10.10am-** We tidy up and get out our literacy books. I explain to the children that today we will be writing letters to Donald Trump to persuade him to do more about global warming. We will be doing a 'Slow Writing' task. This is where the children are given certain sentence types to help them structure their writing.
- **10.30am-** Break time. Today I am on duty and will be supervising the astroturf pitches. I can see some silky skills on display here and there!
- **10.45am-** We carry on with our writing. I ask the children to come and show me what they have done so far. I give the children feedback to help them improve.
- **11.30am-** We do a guided comprehension session. Today we are looking at a science fiction text.
- **12:00pm-** For the last 20 minutes we look at a SPAG (spelling, punctuation and grammar). Today we are looking at subordinating and coordinating conjunctions.
- **12.20pm-** Lunchtime. On Tuesday lunchtimes I run a maths investigation club for some of our Year 6 children.
- **1.00pm-** I have some lunch and speak to Mrs Gibson, who will be taking my class this afternoon.
- **1.20pm-** Every other Tuesday I have an afternoon out of class to do some management tasks. This week I am looking at Year 5 and 6 maths books. I take four books per class and give the teachers written feedback.
- **3.30pm-** I go back to class to check how the children have got on. This week I have had a number of meetings after school. Firstly, with the support of Mr Beisly, I hold a SATs meeting for parents. After this I attended a whole staff meeting about safeguarding, and then met the manager of the company that delivers our ICT support.
- **6:00pm-** Finally it is home time! I tend to spend some time at night replying to emails or doing some lesson planning.
