YEAR 6 KINGSWOOD RESIDENTIAL

Year 6 had a fantastic few days at Kingswood Colomendy this half term. The action-packed residential trip included loads of exciting activities, including caving, fencing, rock-climbing and volleyball. The children's nerves were tested to the limit after taking a flight on the stomach-churning 3G swing and a walk along the dizzyingly high balance beam, before braving the infamous 'leap of faith'!

Their teamwork skills were developed through group challenges, such as building dens in the forest and constructing their own cars using only logs, barrels and rope. The ultimate test of faith in their teammates came when the children did the 'nightline'. Each group had to complete an obstacle course blindfolded using only a rope and the person in front of them as a guide!

"My favourite part of Eureka was when we got to speak to the robot." **Woody 1JJ**



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
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BABY HANNAH VISITS RECEPTION ————



A small group of children from Oswald Road visited Manchester Central Library last month to celebrate Roald Dahl Day. The children were selected for the special trip after they entered a competition to design the school's Charlie and the Chocolate Factory book bench.

The event at Central Library was put on to celebrate Roald Dahl's 101st birthday. During the trip the children got to visit a life-sized LEGO model of Charlie Bucket, as well as seeing their very own book bench on display alongside another Roald Dahl themed bench, which was designed by a fellow Manchester school.

The event also marked the official unveiling of the LEGO build of Charlie, which is composed of 8,960 bricks and took 53 hours to construct. The model is one of six Roald Dahl character brick builds across the country that have been created by Duncan Titmarsh – the UK's only certified LEGO professional builder.
