Headteacher's Page



To all the families of Oswald Road Primary School,

I just wanted to say what a brilliant term we have had. To start with, I have been amazed by the wonderful sporting achievements of our children. They have been involved in athletic tournaments, cross country and the girls' football league. Our children really have shone! I was also really happy to introduce Hoot Camp (our sporty holiday club) and was thrilled that we had such an amazing uptake. We were delighted to have been able to introduce a great range of after school sports clubs this term, run by our Sports Coach Kieran Bentley. Bikeability for our Year 5 children has also been happening, helping our children become more confident bike riders.

The work our children did on World War 1 was very thought-provoking. From letters in role in Year 1 to the excellent installation of poppies in the hall – all around school the children really showed such an interest and such care.

Cultural Diversity Day was amazing as always. We are just so lucky to have so many parents who will come in to our school and share their culture with our children. Our children and staff gain so much from this and there was a wonderful community feeling across school.

We were also thrilled to have raised over £1,000 for Children in Need and Year 1's Dance-a-thon was particularly successful! You must have all been exhausted! We were also very lucky to have a visit to school from Pudsey Bear himself!

The children have been working hard and we have introduced our new enquiry based curriculum for topic, which is being enjoyed across school. This is allowing for real depth in learning via well thought through questioning. We continue to follow the White Rose curriculum for maths, which provides an excellent level of challenge and I have been so happy to hear a continued rise in our children relishing the thought of challenge. There is a real development in resilience across school and this has been great to see. Super Learning Week for science was very much enjoyed by our children and staff. The children worked on a large range of practical science activities and of course learnt so much from this. We also enjoyed a good old dress up day! The class assemblies really have shown what a range the children have been covering and, as always, seeing our children so confident and happy presenting this to their adults is just a joy.

Our priorities have been focusing on handwriting, spelling, language gap and challenge. We worked last year on language gap and continue this year. Our staff have worked hard to develop strategies to support understanding of a range of vocabulary in both books and across the curriculum and this has become part of the everyday teaching in all classrooms. We invested in a handwriting programme to support swift improvement in this area and so far the books are showing our handwriting is improving across school.

We've had many trips, including the Kingswood residential. As always, we have had many comments from people about our children's great behaviour whilst they are out of school. The residential was a great hit as always. The children were buzzing when they returned to school, sharing stories of the many wonderful things they had done and the jokes and fun they had shared.

We have seen excellent improvements to our playground in the last term thanks to our wonderful PTA. The new willow garden area with woodchip flooring to replace the mud that was previously there and a climbing frame and monkey bars have all been a massive hit with the children! The Year 1 area has been transformed with astroturf, a hill with a tunnel through and toadstools – the children just love it! And the movement of the fencing between Early Years Foundation Stage and the main school has created more play space for our children. A lot has been done in such a short space of time – with more exciting development to follow. Thanks to our PTA and the events they have run, we have been able to source these improvements. The Winter Fair really was a fantastic event, with so much to do. And the Auction of Promises was a great idea and very popular. A thanks to our staff who offered a range of promises, which I saw the children really enjoying. And I know I loved having Miss Mattingly join me as Headteacher for the day. What an eye for detail!

The Christmas shows were lovely and again it was a delight to see how confident our children are and how they work so well as a team.

We are so lucky to work with such fantastic children but I also want to say how lucky I am to work with such a dedicated staff team. A staff team who support each other and share a laugh together. This makes for a wonderful working environment and one that our children thrive in.

"I like the tunnel in Year 1 because you can slide down it!" Gracie 1JD


"I like the monkey bars because I used to go on the ones at Longford Park before we moved house and I miss them so I am very happy we have some at school now!" Sofia 3CM

You said | We did

My daughter says that the children are being rushed at lunchtime to eat their food and make their way out of the dinner hall.

Our Lunchtime Lead, Wendy Gibson, will now be working through lunch every Monday to observe lunchtimes to see where changes need to be made.

My child says that the dinner hall is very dirty and often children are purposefully throwing food on the floor.

Our new Business Manager, Craig Taylor, is currently looking to see if it would be possible for us to get a floor cleaning machine for the hall, which means that the entire floor can be cleaned in under 10 minutes. Our Lunchtime Lead, Wendy Gibson, will be looking into the claim that children are purposefully throwing food on the floor and tackling this issue as necessary.

Is healthy eating at lunchtime promoted enough?

We are currently working on promoting healthy eating both at breaktime and at lunchtime and are looking to introduce a new policy to discourage children having unhealthy snacks in the new year. We'll also be sharing ideas for healthy snacks and photos of healthy lunchboxes that we spot- from both children and teachers!

Parking around school (eg. on double yellow lines) is still a major issue, despite all of the work the school has done to discourage parents from doing so.

We have arranged for a team of local PSCOs to come in and deliver an assembly, linked to our Rights Respecting work (in particular to Article 19- 'We all have the right to a safe environment'). The aim is that the children will feel empowered to challenge their parents if they are parking or stopping in the wrong place.

I want to register for EasyFundraising, but I don't know where to find the link for it.

Our Communications Manager, Ellie Linton, has added the link to EasyFundraising to the homepage of the school website and to the bottom of the Weekly Update, along with instructions on how parents can use it to donate money to the PTA for free, simply by shopping online at selected retailers.
