The flags sparked lots of interesting conversations. Children were overheard explaining to each other what the rainbow flag stands for and why it is important for us to talk about it. #### YEAR 6 FIRST AID WORKSHOP

As part of their 'Extreme Earth' topic, Year 6 looked at the different types of extreme weather and natural disasters that occur around the world and the risks and devastation that these events can cause. To equip them for future life should they be caught in a life-threatening situation, the children took part in a first aid workshop delivered by the Red Cross.



During the workshop the children learnt essential first aid skills, including how to help someone who is unresponsive, bleeding heavily or burnt. They were also taught how to assess and manage risks to make informed choices when helping others, and given training to build their confidence and willingness to help in a first aid emergency.





#### YEAR 3 ROMAN CATAPULTS

Year 3 have been making Roman catapults in science this half term as part of their topic, 'What did the Romans do for us?' The children took their finished calapults into the playground to test how effective they were, using a ruler to measure their results.







# **RED NOSE DAY**

To raise money for Comic Relief we held a pyjama day and asked children to bring in £1 for the charity. We raised a fantastic £404.26, plus £143.70 from the after school bake sale, which is absolutely fantastic! This year we suggested that children could think of plastic-free ways to wear a red nose, to help reduce the pollution caused by single-use plastics. We were very pleased to see lots of painted on noses this year!









### YEAR 5 RAINFOREST WORKSHOP

As part their topic for this half term on Brazil, Year 5 took part in a rainforest workshop. During the workshop the children learnt about the animals of the rainforests and examinined tribal artefacts from the Amazon and beyond. They also did a study on indigenous people and the rainforest ecosystem, looking at some of the products from the rainforest and considering some of the problems and our own impact. The workshop also gave the children the opportunity to get hands-on with some of the creepy crawly creatures found in the rainforest, such as tarantulas and millipedes!



The TT Rockstars competition ended this week with a victory for 3EW! They win the trophy and pizza party. Well done, rock champions!

Over the course of the competition we estimate that Oswald Road children have answered over 3.8 million questions. That works out at an average of about 9,000 questions per child! The TT Rockstars competition relaunches for the summer term in the first week back, with the addition of Year 2.

In further news, Oswald Road is now the fastest school in the local area at an average speed of 2.25 seconds per question per child. This tops Chorlton Park Primary (4.05 seconds) and St John's (4.83 seconds). Rock on!

The children got to have a go at creating their own masterpieces, using paint and pastels to make certain objects stand out in their pictures, in the style of LS Lowry.



This year's Network Choir concluded all their hard work over the last few months with an outstanding two days of performances. The Manchhester Schools Network Choir is made up of a network of schools and is led by the fantastic Jules Gibb, an experienced and talented musician.

This year's young musicians have been working on a performance written especially for Network Choir by Jules with the theme of the Peterloo Massacre, as this year is the bicentenary of the event.

Every Friday afternoon the Year 4 singers have been out at various locations, including the People's History Museum and the Whitworth Art Gallery, to rehearse their Peterloo performance with the choirs from the partner schools.

The children then took their performance on tour, firstly to all of the venues they have been rehearsing at, followed by a day performing at each of the partner schools, including here at Oswald Road.

As of this week we have banned football playing in the playground before school starts, as there have been occasions in which children have brought in their own footballs from home to play with in the playground before school, which have subsequently caused injury to other children. We have a policy of only using soft foam balls in school to prevent these sorts of injuries happening during the school day.
