To all the families of Oswald Road Primary School,

As another school year comes to a close, I'd like to take this opportunity to say a massive thank you to our children, staff and parents.

Our children work so hard, whilst having such fun. I see so many happy faces every day and I love the way they come and tell me the things they've learnt and show me the work they're proud of.

Our staff truly are amazing and show such dedication. Their sheer passion for making a difference is noted on a daily basis and I am so grateful for all they do.

We stand by the fact that we will never be a school who only care about results, however do understand they play an important part of how the school is judged. Our results this year have been excellent, with our EYFS, Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 all doing really well. We trialled the new Multiplications Check in Year 4 and performed significantly better than the sample group. Our levels of Greater Depth (children working above the level of Expected Standard) were significantly higher than national in Year 6, with our combined Greater Depth (children gaining this measure in reading, writing and maths) nearly doubling national figures.

There is so much more to school life than figures and I'm proud that within times of budget constraints we have a Governing Body who remain committed to providing such a high quality provision for music, art and PE. I am proud we continue to keep a broad and interesting curriculum (further developments coming next year) even in times of pressure on results. I'm very proud to be Head of this lovely school and be in such a privileged position to be working with such brilliant staff and amazing children every day.

Can I wish you all the best for the summer and I look forward to seeing you in September.

The costumes and props for the Oswald Road group, which were designed by artist Austin Hewitt, were based on the theme of frustration and calm- when you get angry or frustrated 'just take 10 and try again!' Austin makes giant puppets, so the big build was a giant human who gets angry and frustrated. The children and adults were dressed as wise owl agitators and pacifiers, to fire him up then calm him down.

During the May half term Xiayan from 4AW performed a Chinese Tai Chi fan dance at the closing ceremony of the 2019 International Taekwondo Championships at Manchester Arena. Xiayan performed with 14 children from the Manchester Chinese Centre, which she goes to every Sunday. She took part in a 9-week course to learn the whole set of dance movements with martial arts elements. Although it was difficult, she learnt it with enthusiasm and determination, spending a lot of time at home practising by following a YouTube video.

The dance group also performed at the Dragon Boat Festival race, which took place at Salford Quays on Sunday 2nd June.





YEAR 3 CHOCOLATE WORKSHOP

As part of their exciting Aztecs topic, Year 3 took part in a workshop with the 'Ministry of Chocolate'. The workshop covered various topics, such as the history and origins of chocolate from 1000 BC to date, the geography of cocoa trees, the cocoa harvesting process, Fairtrade aspects of chocolate and how chocolate is made in a factory. The workshop finished with a practical chocolate making session, where each child made their own individually moulded chocolate.







BRITISH VALUES DAY

Here at Oswald Road Primary School we aim to embrace and uphold all of our British Values and one way we do this is by holding an annual British Values Day. The four British Values which we talk to all of our children about are: democracy; the rule of law; individual liberty; and mutual respect and tolerance for those with different faiths and beliefs and for those without faith.

To teach them about democracy and how it works in our country, the Year 1 classrooms were turned into polling stations. Children were also encouraged to wear traditional dress relating to their culture to celebrate the diversity we have in school.

The facilitators, who played the lady of the house and her chief servant, helped the classes to learn about Tudor celebrations, food and homes as well as discovering how different life was for rich and poor people during this period in British history.

YEAR 2 TRIP TO STAIRCASE HOUSE

As part of this half term's topic, called '17th Century Madness', Year 2 visited Staircase House in Stockport. On the trip the children dressed up and acted out the story of The Great Fire of London from the eyes of Samuel Pepys, using all the rooms of the house to tell the parts of the story.

They then learnt about the beak doctor and cures for the plague, and had a go at making their own herbal remedies using sage, cloves, rose petals, mint and bay leaves. Finally, the Year 2s looked at how the building was made and had a go at building their own mini wall using the wattle and daub technique.



















HUCKLOW RESIDENTIAL-

A group of Year 5 & 6 children were lucky enough to go on a residential visit to Hucklow this half term. 'Send a Child to Hucklow' is a charity that provides free holidays to rural Derbyshire for groups of children. We are so appreciative that they enabled a group of our children to attend.

On the first day of their trip the children visited 'The Heights of Abraham', where they travelled up the mountain at Matlock in a cable car. They then had free access to all of the activities at the top, including cave tours, adventure playgrounds, Victoria's Tower, Tinker's Shaft and the Masson Centre, where there is a fossil from a dinosaur!

The second day was spent touring Speedwell and Peak Caverns. The children spent the morning visiting Peak Cavern (also known as 'The Devil's Arse'), where they learned about the rope makers who lived there during the last century. In the afternoon they went on a boat ride through the tunnels at Speedwell Cavern.

On their final day of the trip the children visited Matlock Farm Park, where they were able to feed a variety of animals including cows, llamas, wallabies and horses. After lunch the children were able to handle guinea pigs, a tortoise, rabbits, a duckling and a chick!
