GLOBAL DAY

'NO PENS DAY' WEDNESDAY

This half term Oswald Road's Nursery & Reception classes took part in an exciting one-day event, alongside schools across the country, called 'No Pens Day Wednesday'.

The aim of the day was to encourage the skills of speaking and listening, which is a part of the Early Years national curriculum. For one day, children in Nursery & Reception put down their pens and all lessons and activities had a focus on speaking and listening skills rather than writing skills. Teachers then assessed what children in their class had learnt about the lesson by listening to what they say about it.

Reading and writing are very important and valuable skills but people are often not aware of how important speaking and listening skills are too. Schools that include speaking and listening in a planned and structured way for children in their lessons see improvement in their classroom involvement. Ofsted inspectors (who check standards in all schools in the country) are noticing more and more that speaking and listening is a really important factor for good teaching and child performance in successful schools.

Laura Tracanna, Assistant Headteacher and Early Years Lead, said: "The day became a celebration of the children's thoughts and feelings as well as an opportunity to celebrate communication in general and all the skills which this requires. The quality of conversations heard around the room was so high and learning became so personalised. It highlighted how good we are at doing this as an Early Years day-in-day-out, but also inspired us to ensure that communication remains at the top of our priority list at all times."







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SHARING A LOVE OF READING!

We love reading at Oswald Road so we thought it would be lovely to share with you some information on reading with your children, book recommendations, and reasons why we love to read...

Some advice from our Reading Lead, Mrs Greenway: "Reading can come easy to some of our children but because it is so easy they will often rush through texts. When asked what happened or for a summary, they can find this tricky and the details are lost. This means that comprehension is nowhere near where actual decoding ability is (reading the print).

"One simple strategy can help fix this! Retelling a story is not only a great way to see if your child understands the plot and the vocabulary but it's also a great way for them to connect what they are reading to other events, stories or ideas. You can ask your child to retell a section in a non-fiction book or a short story or a chapter in a longer book to you. This will tell you if they are listening to their reading. They should be able to tell you confidently the main facts/events in order, using some text specific vocabulary.

"This could be followed up with some questions e.g. What do you think the character will do next? What is the message or lesson of this story? Which section was the most interesting/exciting part? Can you replace a particular word in this sentence or can you find a word that means X?"

Mr Wheeldon's Recommendation

Title: A Short History of Nearly Everything Author: Bill Bryson Genre: Non fiction - History of Science

A wonderful, clearly written book about the history of the Earth and general science, suitable for those with or without a scientific background. It has many biographical stories about famous scientists, including several who worked in Manchester. Educational and funny - highly recommended!

Miss Rice's Recommendation

I've been doing the 52 book challenge in 2019 (1 book a week) and I finished it last week...ahead of schedule!

I reread the entire Harry Potter series as part of the challenge... I haven't read them since I was at school myself. I still have my original Chamber of Secrets from when I was in Year 4!

Miss Rowe's Recommendations

Title: The Book of Dust Volume Two: The Secret Commonwealth Author: Philip Pullman Genre: Fantasy

This is the follow-up to the children's series, His Dark Materials, but is aimed at adults who read these books when they were younger. Lyra is now 20 years old. This story tracks her journey across Europe and into Asia, in search of a city haunted by demons.

Title: The Testaments Author: Margaret Atwood Genre: Fantasy/Dystopia

This is the sequel to The Handmaid's Tale so would appeal to anyone who has read that and wants to know what became of Offred and Gilead. The sequel is set 15 years later and includes three testaments from female narrators who lived in Gilead.

Mrs Savage's Recommendations

I have just finished reading The Goldfish Boy by Lisa Thompson with my son. It is about a boy who has OCD. He doesn't like germs and washes his hands incessantly. While he is stuck in his bedroom, he watches the neighbours in his close as they go about their everyday business. One day Mr Charles' grandson Teddy goes missing so Matthew has to turn detective and piece together things he has seen. It was a really gripping story coupled together with a carefully scripted narrative about one little boy's struggle to overcome things that had happened in the past in order to start fixing the present. We loved it.

Mrs Howard "I love sharing books with my little girl every day. It's so lovely to cuddle up together and share the stories and pictures and talk about what we've read. We enjoy taking ideas from stories and developing our own role play games, which is good fun and has also been a good way of helping develop her language."

Mrs Hickman loves to read whenever she has any spare time! "I love how reading can take you to a whole new place, and allows you to escape the everyday madness!"

Mrs Greenway's Recommendation

Title: Rooftoppers Author: Katherine Rundell Genre: Adventure Suggested age: 9+

Review: This is a quirky, beautifully written story about love, hope and courage. There are some interesting points for discussion. I loved this book and would definitely read it again!

Interesting fact: Katherine Rundell, the author, starts each day with a cartwheel and believes that reading is almost exactly the same as cartwheeling- it turns the world upside down...

Miss Cawley's Recommendations

I second Miss Greenway's recommendation; Year 5 have been studying Rooftoppers in Guided Reading this half term – we're hooked. I also recommend 'The Girl of ink and Stars' and 'The Nowhere Emporium'

Title: The Girl of Ink and Stars Author: Kiran Millwood Hargraves Genre: Fantasy Suggested age: 9+

Review: This is a cleverly written book with a charismatic main character. It is a modern story which incorporates myth, magic and even a dash of politics into a fantasy world. This is a story about friendship, courage and the importance of finding your way! If you love Alice in Wonderland or escaping to fantasy worlds through fiction this one's for you!

Title: The Nowhere Emporium Author: Ross Mackenzie Genre: Fantasy & Adventure Suggested age: 9+

Review: 'The Nowhere Emporium' gripped me from the start and hooked me right through to the end. The main character is an orphan who discovers a whole new magical world with wonders beyond his imagination – this is a great book to read with an adult!

As part of their topic 'What Can We Learn From The Suffragette Struggle?', Year 6 visited the People's History Museum, where they attended a 'Living History' workshop about the life story of a suffragette named Hannah Mitchell. During the workshop the children created arguments to debate different types of protests. They then looked around the galleries to bring their learning to life.

"It was an interesting visit. My favourite part was when Hannah was acting out parts of her life."

"The banners were very colourful. I liked pretending to be a shopkeeper in the 1940s. I loved wearing realistic clothes from the time."

Mrs Gibson said: "The visit enabled the children to learn details about the suffragettes and the fight for the vote. It was interesting to learn that banners were not allowed and that women had to go in disguise to protest for suffrage. Excellent acting and an interesting workshop for the children!"



AUTUMN TERM QUALITY ASSURANCE VISIT- GOVERNING BODY UPDATE

At Oswald Road we regularly ask for an external audit of the teaching and learning across the school. This term the governors were delighted to read the feedback from the external Quality Assurance professional, Adrian Guy. His focus this term was the curriculum.

He was very pleased with what he saw: "There is much about the curriculum and classroom practice that is strong." He also reflected on the "high ambition and drive" the staff have for the school. While the curriculum was recognised as strong in the most recent Ofsted inspection (September 2018), the inspection framework has since changed.

The school has made a good start to mapping progression in various subjects and this will continue through the year. We will welcome Adrian's return later on in the school year to see how we are getting on!





YEAR 4 TRIP TO 'THE BEATLES STORY'

As part of their topic on the 1960's, Year 4 went on a trip to Liverpool to visit 'The Beatles Story' - a museum and exhibition all about the Fab Four and their history. During their visit the children visited the exhibition wearing audio commentary sets and learned all about the history of the Beatles. On the way through they visited the Cavern Club, boarded an airliner to the USA, and even walked through the Yellow Submarine! They were then entertained in the Discovery Area by dressing up in 1960's outfits, playing a giant piano, preparing a piece of pop art and learning about famous events of the 1960's.
