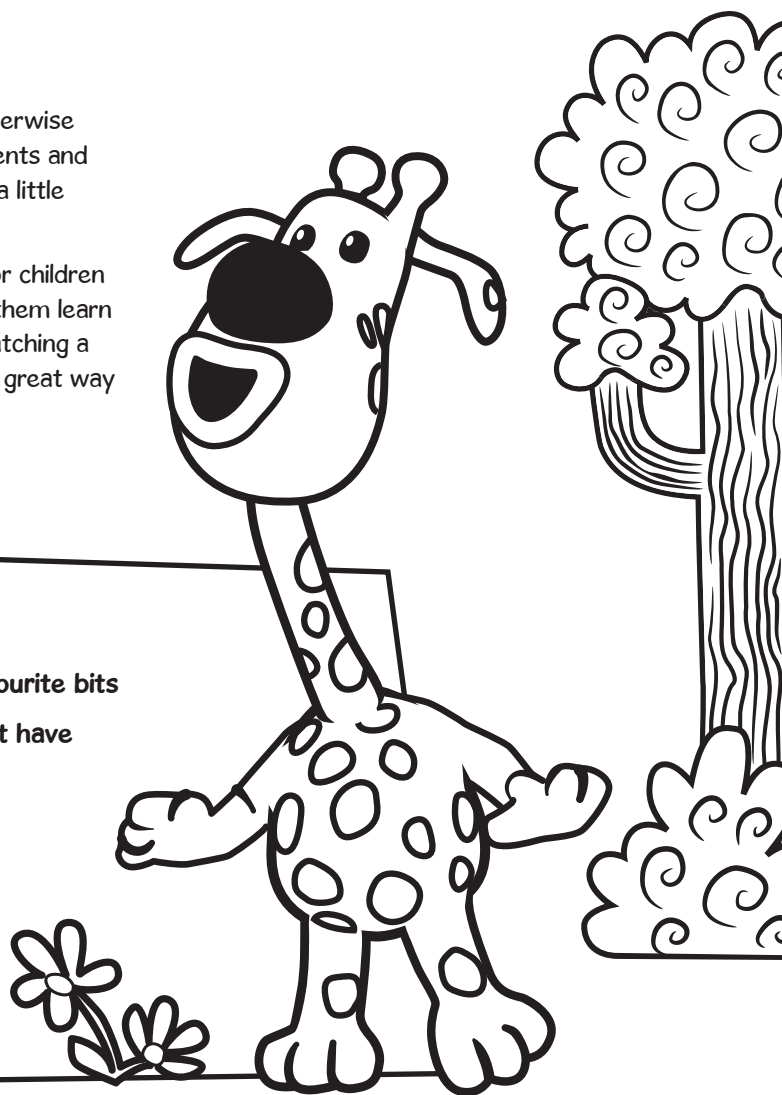
The most intensive period of speech and language development for children is during the first three years of life. Children need adults to help them learn to talk and learn through playing, talking and listening together. Watching a quality television programme designed for young children can be a great way to stimulate conversation.

Here are some top tips for watching programmes together:

- Talk about the characters
- Talk about the storyline of the programme and your favourite bits
- Be prepared to answer any questions your children might have
- Play out the stories
- Make up your own stories about the characters

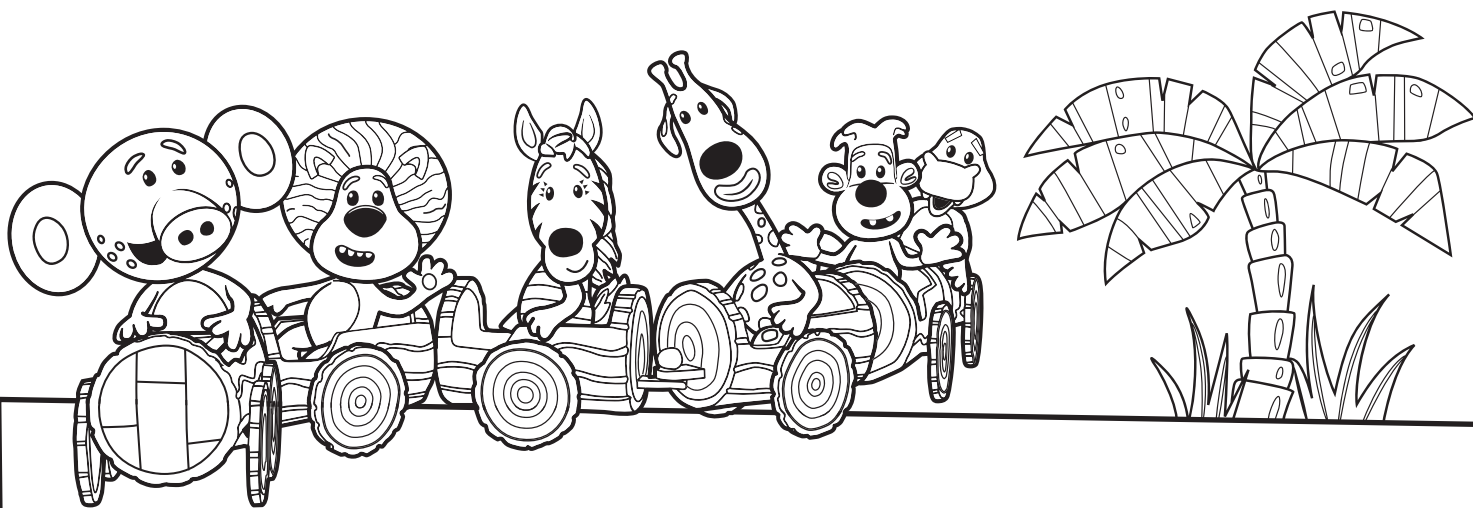
The key is to build talking and listening into what happens before, during and after watching the programmes.

REPETITION

Talk about the characters from the show, where they live and what other animals you might find in a jungle. Talk about the animals you like or don't like and why.

RHYTHM

See if you and your child can recreate the Raa Raa beat by clapping it out and singing along or by using an instrument such as a tambourine, shaker or drum.

RHyme

Sing the monkey inspired rhyme below to help your child with their understanding of rhyme and number. Sing to the tune of '10 Green Bottles.'

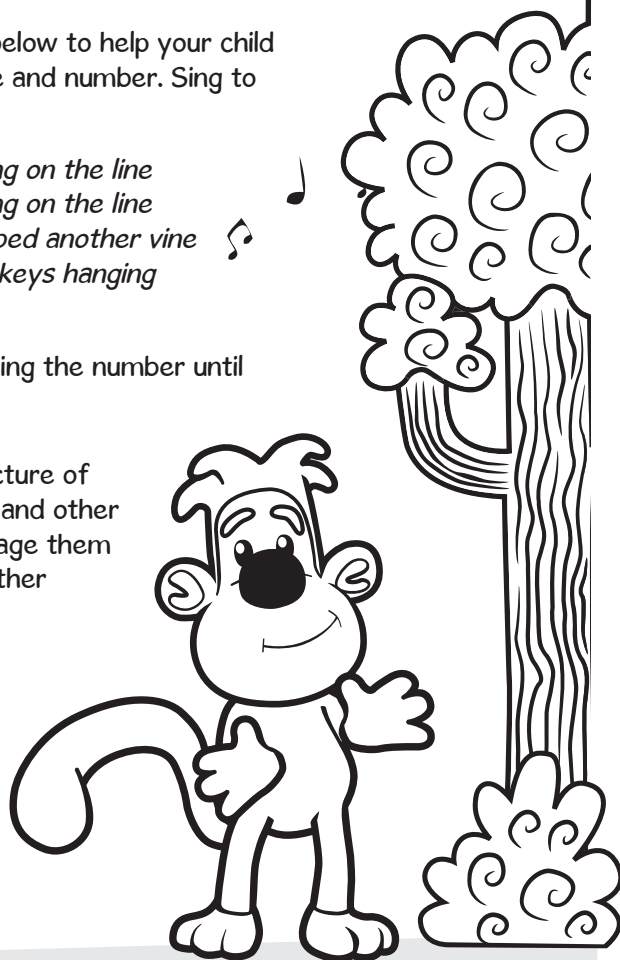
*10 little monkeys hanging on the line
10 little monkeys hanging on the line
When one fell off and climbed another vine
There were 9 little monkeys hanging
on the line*

Continue singing the song decreasing the number until no monkeys are left.

RETELLING

Encourage your child to draw a picture of the story showing the characters and other elements they remember. Encourage them to retell the story to a friend or other family member.
