

This letter will tell you about the Summer Reading Challenge and explain how your child and school are taking part this year.

What is the Summer Reading Challenge?

The <u>Summer Reading Challenge</u> is a challenge for children to read six library books (or more) over the holidays. It runs from 3 July until 16 September in all Manchester Libraries (although your child can join NOW). It is a great opportunity to share and talk about books as a family and to celebrate your child's reading achievements. Joining the Challenge is a great way to keep motivated too.

By getting involved in the Summer Reading Challenge, your child is:

- Improving their literacy. We know that reading for fun improves literacy
- Supporting their studies. Reading for pleasure is one of the most important factors in children's academic success
- Improving their wellbeing; reading for pleasure improves your mood
- Learning to understand others and their point of view
- Having a great time! Joining thousands of other children across the country, reading books, sharing their thoughts, and taking part in some great activities

Your school is part of our new approach this year

Your school has agreed to work with Manchester Libraries to encourage every pupil in school to read this summer. As part of this, your child will receive the following in school:

 Summer Reading Challenge resources, including a Collector Poster and stickers, bookmark and pencil

With your school's agreement, your child has already been joined to the Summer Reading Challenge and is now a member of the library. Your child may already have a library card from previous years but if not, you can ask for a card (for free) when your visit your local Manchester library. You do not need to bring any further information or proof of address. It is free to borrow books and there are no charges if you return books late.

What happens next?

You can visit a Manchester Library now and start to borrow books – **you don't need to wait until 3 July**. Your child's details are already on the system. When the new term starts in September, we will let school know how many library books your child has read. Medals and certificates will be awarded in the library to children who complete the Challenge by reading six books or more.

How do I find my local library?

It's free for adults to join the library too, so why not join up too when you're there or join online? And there are no fines on adult library books either!

What if I don't want my child to be part of this?

The Summer Reading Challenge is recognised as a means to support reading and learning, which after the disruption due to Covid, is particularly important. This is why your school has agreed to join your child to the Challenge automatically. In order to join your child to the scheme, we now hold some of your child's personal data on the Library Management System. This includes: Name, Address, School and Date of Birth.

You have the right to opt-out of Library membership (and therefore the Summer Reading Challenge). To do so, please contact your local library or email libraries@manchester.gov.uk. We will then remove your child from the scheme and delete your child's information completely from the library management system.
